



Pupil Premium Spending Report 2015-2016

1. Summary Information

2. Nature of Support

The funding received from Pupil Premium in 2015-16 was allocated in the following ways:

- To provide targeted support across the school for educational needs.
- Funding additional TA interventions aimed at improving outcomes for identified children, including those who are FSM and to part fund the TA support in every class to facilitate targeted learning ensuring all children have access to quality first teaching.
- To provide access to the cluster Parent Support Worker either from our referral or through request from themselves.
- To subsidised uniform costs where we will pay 50% of costs to ensure they can afford new uniform for pupils on FSM.
- Subsidised extra tuition in subjects such as music in order for the children to widen their skills and interest in other areas of the curriculum.
- To fund Cool Milk to provide free milk for all pupil premium children.
- To support attendance at our Breakfast and After school clubs in order to improve the attendance and punctuality of pupils.

3. Impact of the Pupil Premium 2015-2016 Spending

Summary

- The pupils who are eligible for additional support through the use of pupil premium funds are spread across the school.
- There were 3 pupils (5% of no on roll) in total.
- 0% are SEN with 0% of those accessing higher needs funding;
- These pupils generally achieve well:

Headlines:

- Pupil premium pupils make good progress in reading and maths, with 100% of PP pupils making 5 or more progress steps from September to the end of Summer 2.

Challenge: There is still a gap between achievement in reading and writing. How can we support PP to achieve the same progress?

Headlines: Service children have made great progress in reading with 83%, writing with 75% and maths with 75% making 5 or more progress steps from September to the end of summer 2.

Challenge: What support/interventions can be planned and organised for writing?

4. Proposed use of the funding for 2016-17:

- Diminish difference in attainment between the PP pupils in relation to national average by sustaining the quality teachers and teaching assistants currently employed at the school, purchasing specific programmes to meet the needs of the disadvantaged children
- Continue to ensure the PP pupils are not disadvantaged from extra-curricular activities by: supporting disadvantaged pupils to access day visits, clubs, uniform and additional tuition such as music
- Utilise the parental support advisor to support disadvantaged children and families
- Continue to support increased attendance so that the gap between the PP pupils
